# **Sports Funding Impact Report**

2019/20

## What is the PE and Sports Premium Funding?

The government has providing funding of over £450 million per annum for academic years 2013-2020 to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

#### **Purpose of funding**

Schools have to spend the sport funding on improving provision of PE and sport but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

The vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium: **ALL** pupils leaving primary school **physically literate** and with the **knowledge**, **skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy**, **active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following **OBJECTIVE:** To achieve <u>self-sustaining improvement</u> in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

#### It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

Key Indicator 1: the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school

Key Indicator 2: the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement

Key Indicator 3: increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

Key Indicator 4: broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

Key Indicator 5: increased participation in competitive sport

#### The school has been receiving the funding since 2015.

- Improved the bank of resources in order to provide the children with opportunities to learn new sports. This has enabled the children to be able to participate in a range of different sports.
- Improved our indoor gym equipment and resources to allow the children to progress to the next level/phase of gymnastics. We have also ensured that staff have had the correct CPD alongside the introduction to the new gymnastic equipment to ensure safety and confidence when using it with the children.
- Additional block of booster swimming sessions for Y6 has increased the number of children leaving school able to swim the 25m.

- Train new playground leaders in upper KS2.
- Aim to achieve the School Games Mark – Silver.
- Continue to audit the resources we have in school to allow the children to continue to have the opportunities we have made available to them.

## Amount of grant received IN YEAR 2019/20: £16,000 + £10 per pupil

This year due to the situation with Covid-19 the supplier relief scheme has been implemented to keep the economy going and ensure PE providers can continue with their provision in the coming years. This year, the opening balance was £-2125.99. The following table details the actions and spend we were able to complete and the impact we felt this made:
